Dear Nativity Family,

Merry Christmas!

We are about to celebrate Christmas, the great mystery of the Word made flesh—Jesus Christ, who entered the world to bring us peace, hope, and salvation. The Infancy Narrative of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke tells us that the Savior was born in an insignificant place. This Good News was first announced to a group of shepherds by an angel.

Shepherds were economically important and symbolically valued in the Bible, yet they were socially marginalized during the time of Jesus. However, they heard the angel's proclamation on that first Christmas night:

"I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For today in the city of David a savior has been born for you who is Messiah and Lord." (Luke 2:10-12).

The birth of Jesus reveals how uniquely God acts. God always chooses the humble to be the instruments of His message. Even amidst the chaos of that night, God's gift of love was visible to those to whom He chose to reveal it.

We are the chosen people of God, to whom He reveals His Good News. God's gift of love becomes tangible in the Eucharist. As the shepherds received the Good News and the Savior, we too are in a privileged position like them, each time we come to the Holy Eucharist.

How do we allow this gift of God to remain alive in our families? Imagine; **God became human, and Jesus continues to give Himself to us in the Eucharist**. How humble we should be as we receive Jesus into our hearts.

How do we grow in wonder of God's love for us? Jesus came to die for us. How can we express the same love in our daily lives? Humility, sacrifice, and God's accessibility are shown in the mystery of the Incarnation.

- How sacrificial is my love toward my family?
- How humble are my attitudes and actions toward others?
- How willing am I to listen and to be with my loved ones?

Imagine God coming so close to us-His own. How close should we be to God and to one another?

May this Christmas fill your hearts and your families with the peace and joy of Christ, the Lord and Savior.

I also want to extend my heartfelt gratitude to each of you for your presence in our parish family. Your faith and

service have enriched our community in countless ways. I think of you and thank God, in my prayers for the gifts of faith, hope, and love you share so wonderfully within our community. May this Christmas bring abundant blessings to you and your loved ones!

May the Lord bless you and your families with a blessed Christmas and a happy, healthy New Year!
